TERRITORIAL ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

The Foundation of Greater Montréal (FGM) wishes to highlight the presence of the Kanien'kehá:ka of the Kahnawà:ke and Kanehsatà:ke communities, which have historically been established on the territory now known as Greater Montreal. It wishes to recognize as well that this territory has also been home over time to several Indigenous nations who established themselves here over several historical periods. Today, a diverse Indigenous population, including First Nations, Métis and Inuit individuals, continues to reside on this territory, in socioeconomically varied conditions.

This territory has long been a place for interaction and exchange among the First Peoples, and is a historic site where the Great Peace of Montreal was signed by 39 First Nations in 1701. In the spirit of peace, justice, and reconciliation, and by drawing inspiration from the ancestral knowledge of the First Peoples, FGM is working to enhance the well-being of the communities of Greater Montreal, and to protect its territory, now and for future generations.

After having joined the Foundation of Greater Montréal's Board of Directors in 2013, I became its Chair in 2016.

Five years have gone by, during which I have witnessed the Foundation's extraordinary progress. There is the steady growth in funds and assets under management, which is testimony to the generosity and commitment of our donors and fund creators, and to the great professionalism and dedication of our staff and volunteers; but beyond that, FGM has become a major player in the Greater Montreal philanthropic and community landscape.

Starting in 2015, when it joined the Collective Impact Project under the auspices of Centraide of Greater Montreal, FGM gave notice of its intention to step up its efforts in the fight against poverty, and to deploy impactful initiatives for the well-being of the city's population. In 2017, when we decided to align our activities with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals, and produced a special edition of our *Vital Signs of Greater Montréal* report on the situation of children, the influence of the Foundation's work continued to grow. New partnerships, and major new projects like Zero Hunger in Montreal, which was developed in 2018-2019, reinforced this momentum. We also significantly broadened the reach of matching programs and programs offering incentives to philanthropy supported by FGM, which benefited hundreds of charitable organizations in all sectors. And in 2020, before the pandemic disrupted life as we knew it, the Foundation celebrated its 20th anniversary, having attained the status of a vital institution, recognized for its leadership and its profound engagement in the Greater Montreal community.

Whether it is with regard to our work on the Foundation's governance and internal regulations, the continuous improvement in the services we offer to the public, or the remarkable increase in FGM's visibility and engagement in the community, I take a great deal of pride in seeing how far we've come over the past few years. I would like to offer my warmest thanks, for their work and their devotion, to all the administrators with whom I served, to every Foundation employee, as well as to my close collaborator over seven years, Yvan Gauthier, thanks to whose efforts this astonishing progress was possible.

The time has now come for me to pass the torch, too. I do so with great emotion, but with the utmost confidence in our future. Under the leadership of Karel Mayrand, the Foundation of Greater Montréal team, from the staff right through to the Board of Directors and its committees, is more solid than ever. From now until 2030 – which will be the next major marker on our journey – and well beyond, FGM will continue to play its role in spreading generosity and as a bridging institution for our community. I am pleased to present to you, for the first time for me personally, the Annual Report of the Foundation of Greater Montréal.

As you will see, FGM had a great deal to be proud of in 2020. On the financial front, despite turbulent times, the Foundation reached all-time highs for number of funds managed and grants distributed in support of the community's well-being. To weather the storm, our team reorganized and grew, and developed new methods, so to be able to reach out to those who were most in need of our help. All of this was achieved in record time, and had to be done via computer screens rather than in person, right in the midst of a transition in the organization's leadership. I would like to take this opportunity to thank my predecessor, Yvan Gauthier, who handed me the reins of a competent and solid team that absolutely met the enormous challenge it faced.

The pandemic brought out the best in us, while also heaping on a good dose of humility. This is a crisis that, due to its breadth and its depth, has forced us into some long and hard thought. It has been a «perfect storm» that brought to the surface pre-existing inequalities in our community. A health crisis, which very rapidly was outstripped by an economic and social crisis, battered those who were already among our most vulnerable citizens: women, racialized or Indigenous persons, youth, the elderly... Our climate crisis, while temporarily forgotten, has not gone away, and also continues to claim victims. These challenges will oblige us, as a philanthropic institution, but also as local and global communities, to change our ways.

For now, we need a twofold response to these challenges. First, we must attend to the humanitarian emergencies. FGM's team worked very hard on this front in the second half of 2020. Thanks to support from governments, and our partners' collaboration, the Foundation was able to offer tangible and immediate help to those members of our community who were hardest hit by the pandemic. But beyond that — and this is going to be a focus in 2021 and into the future — we are going to have to come up with new solutions to the problems we face. «Business as usual» will not be good enough; in fact, it won't even be possible. When we finally make our way out of the storm, we are going to have to do better. We are going to have to, first and foremost, listen to the people we serve. Then, we are going to have to mobilize the philanthropic sector, and the entire community, behind the most innovative and the most broadly foundational solutions and partnerships. We hope that you join us on this quest.

JANUARY

FGM celebrates 20 years of existence

For the occasion, the Foundation hosted a cocktail reception at the Hall of Bronzes of the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, with more than 300 guests in attendance. A collective work of art was created, with help from MU (an organization that produces murals reflecting Montreal's communities) and the artist Christian Robert de Massy.

APRIL

Launch of the COVID-19 Collective Fund

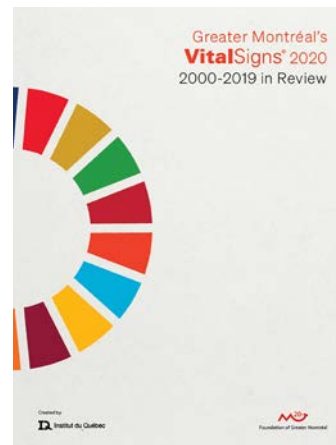
With the support of several benefactors, private foundations and businesses, FGM established this fund, which made possible the distribution of \$1,563,930 in support of community organizations, thereby offering immediate assistance to groups affected by the pandemic and its consequences.



MAY

More than \$7.4 M allocated via the Emergency Community Support Fund (ECSF)

The ECSF is a federal government COVID-19 response initiative, with funds being deployed by community foundations, the Canadian Red Cross and Centraide United Way Canada across the country in order to provide aid to frontline organizations, and thereby to vulnerable populations. In the ECSF's first phase, FGM distributed more than \$7.4 M to various organizations.



JUNE

Launch of the Vital Signs of Greater Montreal 2020 report

Produced in partnership with the Institut du Québec, this special edition paints a picture of the evolution of Greater Montreal over the last 20 years, and puts forward a vision of Greater Montreal in 2030 as expressed by a new generation of leaders.

JUNE

Karel Mayrand becomes FGM's President and CEO

On June 22, Yvan Gauthier, the Foundation's President and CEO since 2013, passed the torch to his successor, Karel Mayrand. In doing so, Mr. Gauthier handed over the reins of the sixth largest community foundation in Canada.



OCTOBER

More than \$3.2 M in additional funds allocated in the ECSF's second phase

FGM was tasked with allocating funds for a second cycle of ECSF assistance, with the goal of contributing further to easing the burdens of vulnerable groups feeling the consequences of COVID-19. To that end, in choosing projects to be funded, FGM focused on marginalized groups or groups with specific needs.

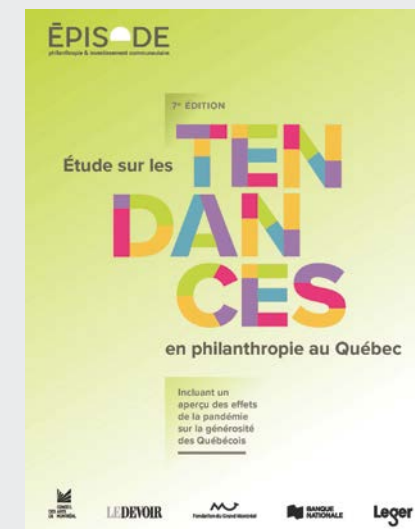
Publication of 20 years of stories

NOVEMBER

National Philanthropy Day

On this occasion, FGM and the Institut Mallet joined forces to present two webinars on the future of philanthropy in Quebec as it relates to the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals and its 2030 timeline. The webinars included some of the future leaders who had been featured in *Vital Signs of Greater Montreal*.



DECEMBER

Launch of the Montreal Climate Partnership

In collaboration with the Trottier Family Foundation, and with the support of the City of Montreal, the Montreal Climate Partnership seeks to mobilize key actors in the community to accelerate the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, and help the city meet the targets set out in its Climate Plan.

RESPONDING TO THE EMERGENCY CREATED BY THE PANDEMIC

1

More than 12 million dollars distributed to meet needs triggered by the pandemic, in support of organizations that assist our most vulnerable populations.

In March of 2020, life as we knew it changed around the world, including at the Foundation of Greater Montréal. Its team quickly adapted to new situations and issues so as to be able to assist frontline organizations that work with the public.

The COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated several societal problems.

Be it the increase in the unemployment rate; the dramatic rise in requests for food aid; the increase in the number of people temporarily experiencing poverty; the greater risk for already vulnerable clientele of losing part of their income; or the greater prevalence of difficulties relating to mental health and domestic violence. A deepening of inequalities to which FGM sought to respond by challenging its usual ways of doing things, listening to organizations, and applying what it learned to its methods and its granting procedures. And always working quickly and effectively so that the speed of the delivery of support to organizations matched the urgency of the needs.

FGM acted as a catalyst among organizations, communities and donors. Several partnerships were initiated, and are still going strong. This collective effort maximizes the support and accompaniment provided to organizations; it's support they need to be able to assist the most vulnerable. Their contribution is indispensable in the fight against the consequences of the pandemic.

Thus, in only a few months, FGM distributed **no less than \$12,228,508 in pandemic response funds to organizations**. Of that amount, \$1,563,930 was disbursed for 119 projects by the COVID-19 Collective Fund initiated by FGM, and \$10,664,578 was distributed among 321 projects through the Emergency Community Support Fund (ECSF). On the following pages, you will read about these initiatives and about some of the many projects spearheaded by organizations FGM supported over these past months.

And apart from the projects, there are the intangibles. The discussions, the learning, the combining of forces, the partnerships. In order to better accompany the organizations we funded, and understand the issues they face and the impact their projects have in the community, **the FGM team led more than 160 conversations with organization leaders**. These dialogues enabled us to better grasp the nature of the community-based sector's response to COVID-19, and to forge key links with a variety of stakeholders. That in turn enabled us to choose the right directions and the right selection criteria for funding, and allowed us to better guide organizations through training and dialogue.

By strengthening the ties among the different actors who are participating in the fight against COVID-19, and will be active in the recovery that comes after, FGM will continue what it started in 2020 and play a significant role in the rebuilding of our communities.

Creation of the COVID-19 Collective Fund, and commitment to an inclusive recovery

Having grasped right from the start of the pandemic of the major impacts the crisis was going to have on community organizations, and the population, FGM's leadership rapidly adjusted its 2020 distribution plan by re-orienting its granting programs, and instituting the COVID-19 Collective Fund.

With support from benefactors, private foundations and businesses, the creation of the COVID-19 Collective Fund enabled our region's community organizations to bolster their capacity to deploy projects that enhanced food security, provided psychosocial accompaniment, or offered emergency shelter for vulnerable individuals.

In just a few weeks, 257 project applications, amounting to \$5,461,639 had been received. Requests for funding targeted mostly the social development sector (60%), health (21%), education (9%), culture (8%) and the environment (2%). The social development and health projects tended to focus on immediate, high priority needs, whereas those in education, culture and the environment were largely of a strategic nature.

In all, FGM disbursed \$1,563,930 for deployment in 119 projects (88 priority projects and 31 strategic projects) in order to help organizations respond to immediate, high-priority needs in the community, develop foundational initiatives, or adjust their services to the pandemic context, so as to better serve their clientele.

The breakdown of funds distributed reflects the needs set out in the project applications; thus, 55% of the projects chosen were in the social development area, 24% in health, 9% in education, 9% in culture and 3% in environment.

This collective approach to mobilizing and bringing together benefactors and partners around a common goal, and a collective fund, created powerful leverage and resulted in greater impact on the community.

In concert with our allies and partners like Centraide of Greater Montreal, the Canadian Red Cross, and several foundations, we were also able to optimize the distribution of support across the territory.

Les Ateliers Speech

Les Ateliers Speech's goal is to bring out the full artistic potential and the passions of youth from disadvantaged backgrounds whose academic path has not been straightforward. The idea is to foster their academic success and boost their self-esteem.

The \$10,000 grant received through the COVID-19 Collective Fund call for projects enabled the organization to develop its online services, and to keep in touch with the young people it serves in the very particular context of the pandemic. Les Ateliers Speech managed to keep its activities going, both in-person and virtually, and quickly adapt to a changing situation. The web platform and short videos the group developed allowed them to create connections among the youth and utilize an approach to socialization that would not otherwise have been possible in the current environment. The digital element did not alter their services, but indeed improved them, complementing individual and group workshops that were held on an in-person basis.

Théâtre Aux Écuries

The COVID-19 crisis negatively affected the cultural sector and its workers. During the pandemic, artists needed more than ever to find ways of getting together and exchanging ideas. With that in mind, the Théâtre Aux Écuries, located in the Villera district, implemented the Super Centre de Création, which the COVID-19 Collective Fund supported in the amount of \$15,000. All during the fall, the Super Centre de Création provided accompaniment and mentorship for every skill category of artists and cultural workers in theatre. A variety of activities, mostly free or tailored to different income levels, was also offered. As well, the Super Centre initiated: a series of get-togethers that looked at ecologically sound production methods and the best use of new technologies; knowledge-sharing workshops; seminars given by invited professionals and partners; and 35 creation residencies in specially-equipped spaces. These initiatives all represented opportunities to maintain connections, continue creating for the theatre, and support workers in the sector.

Collective Fund For Recovery

At the end of 2020, FGM began to work towards the implementation of a Collective Fund for Recovery in support of the Greater Montreal community, which will be launched in 2021. The goal of the fund is to bring together philanthropic resources in Greater Montreal to ensure a postpandemic recovery that will be dynamic and inclusive, bringing forward a positive vision of the future, and taking into account the issues, constraints and new realities stemming from the pandemic.

With an emphasis on equity, inclusion, reconciliation and overcoming discrimination, the Collective Fund for Recovery will offer support that is tailored to the issues and challenges that have emerged over these last months, most notably with regards to food security, mental health and social isolation, and homelessness, including better access to housing.

In the post-pandemic world, community organizations will continue to play a major role. FGM will seek to unify the philanthropic sector behind the idea that we must act collectively in order to rebuild our communities in an equitable fashion.



Emergency Community Support Fund

In the months following the launch of the COVID-19 Collective Fund, the Foundation of Greater Montréal, through the Emergency Community Support Fund (ECSF), also supported organizations that responded to a multitude of urgent needs triggered by COVID-19, with assistance being provided in particular to vulnerable populations.

The ECSF is a federal government initiative deployed by community foundations, the Canadian Red Cross and Centraide United Way Canada across the country. It provides assistance to organizations that operate on the front lines, and thus also to the vulnerable populations they serve. Several

of these organizations do offer their services to the public at large, but the projects chosen within the ECSF framework had to specifically target vulnerable groups that were more severely affected by the fallout from the pandemic, such as women, racialized or immigrant individuals, young people, disabled persons and natural caregivers, or the elderly.

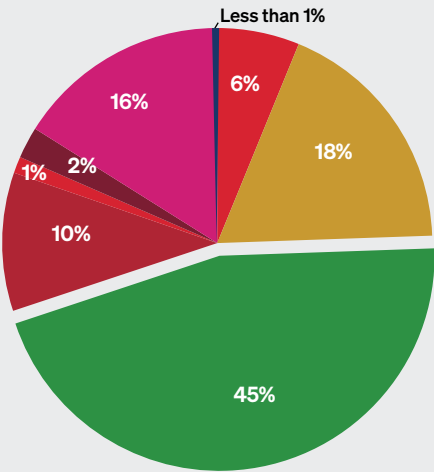
FGM is proud to have contributed to the implementation of this initiative on its territory. In 2020, over two granting cycles, the Foundation was able to direct 11 million additional dollars to 321* projects in the Greater Montreal area.

This backing from the Government of Canada enabled us to bolster several organizations' capacity to deploy projects that enhanced food security for vulnerable individuals, offered psychosocial assistance, or provided emergency shelter, for example.

ECSF, Phase 1

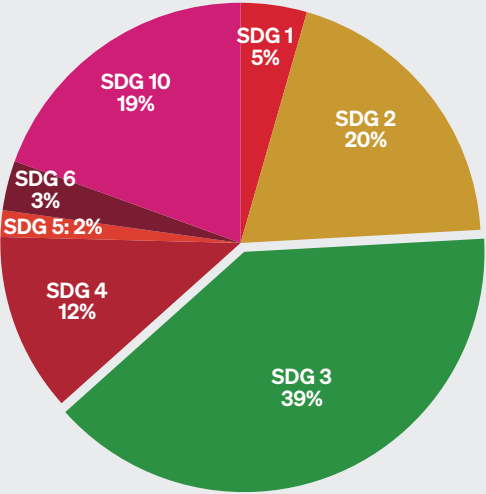
On April 21, 2020, the Prime Minister of Canada unveiled the Emergency Community Support Fund. This initiative was part of a range of emergency measures brought out in response to COVID-19.

FGM contributed to the deployment of the Fund in support of the Greater Montreal community by carrying out project selection, and by ensuring that grants were distributed in a prompt and effective way on its territory.

The number of applications was high, a clear indicator of how much impact the pandemic was having, and of how many emergency situations needed to be attended to. In just two months, so one month before the official end of the program, 384 projects seeking nearly \$16M (\$15,645,247) were presented to FGM and evaluated continuously by its team. Of those, 215 were approved, or 56%, with a resulting disbursement of \$7,425,000. One hundred projects were based on the Island of Montréal, 47 on the North Shore and in Laval, and 68 on the South Shore and in the Montérégie region.

These projects dealt with food security, social isolation, modifying services to align with physical distancing requirements, healthcare (including mental health), bridging the digital divide, and education. Of the projects that were funded, 74% came from the social development sector, in which the needs exploded, 14% were in health, 11% in education, and 1% in sports and recreation. Meanwhile, several grants also empowered organizations to undertake or speed up a shift to digital tools, which allowed them to adjust, and even sometimes to augment, their services, despite the situation.

The rapid disbursement of more than \$7.4 million dollars to organizations enabled emergency aid to be channeled to vulnerable groups, thus lessening the consequences of COVID-19.

Loisirs et Répit Sans Limites

Founded in Boucherville in 1986, Loisirs et Répit Sans Limites (Leisure and Rest Without Limits) is an organization that serves children, youth and adults living with an intellectual disability or an autism spectrum disorder, and their parents. The association focuses on the development and integration into the community of young people, while providing an environment where a sense of respect for differences leads to fulfilment and growth for all. It provides leisure activities, and opportunities for socialization that are stimulating and suited to children, and in doing so, also offers some respite for families.

Seeking to continue its activities while still respecting physical distancing and public health measures imposed due to COVID-19, Loisirs et Répit Sans Limites submitted a project proposal to FGM in phase 1 of the ECSF. The project was the recipient of a \$75,000 grant to cover the

added costs in staffing and equipment, which meant a summer day camp could be provided for the younger and less autonomous members, and daily activity for the more autonomous ones. In a lockdown period, these moments of leisure activity for the young ones, and of rest for their parents and siblings, were especially welcome.

Loisirs et Répit Sans Limites also obtained support from the Foundation in phase 2 of the ECSF; the organization received a grant of \$27,000 for the continuation of leisure and respite services over the fall and winter.

Service d'aide à l'emploi de l'Est

Created in 1983, the Service d'aide à l'emploi de l'Est (SAEE) is a non-profit organization that aims to make individuals more employable. Situated in the East End of Montreal, it offers its services to the entire Greater Montreal community. It works with individuals who are unemployed or whose employment status is precarious, workers who are seeking new challenges or a career change, and businesses. Its clientele is mainly youth, racialized communities, individuals living below the poverty line and those with a criminal past, who are seeking employment.

Their «Garder le cap» (Stay the course) project, which was the recipient of a \$71,999 grant in phase 1 of the ECSF, enabled SAEE to continue to offer its services, while doubling up on certain activities, a circumstance created by health measures required as a result of COVID-19. The funding also allowed SAEE to offer access to computers, which in turn enabled employment seekers to participate in virtual activities like job interviews and online training from SAEE's offices.

ECSF, Phase 2

In October of 2020, a second funding cycle for the Emergency Community Support Fund was announced, in order to further contribute to easing the burdens on vulnerable populations still suffering the consequences of COVID-19. **FGM was assigned the responsibility for distributing more than 3.2 million dollars in additional funding.**

In less than a month, 541 project proposals were received, with requests totalling more than \$21M (\$21,396,709), in other words, nearly 700% of the amount that was actually available.

FGM had committed itself to integrating lessons learned from the first phase into the second phase of deployment, and to taking into consideration the feedback and the major qualitative and quantitative trends that came out of its many conversations with organizations as it refined its selection process. In particular, it modified its selection criteria in order to reach out to populations that generally receive little or no funding. It targeted sectors where the needs were the most pressing.

Out of 541 proposals received, 106 were supported in 2020*, of which 61 were based on the Island of Montreal, 20 on the North Shore and 25 on the South Shore and in Montérégie.

The social development and health sectors continued to account for the bulk of the proposals presented, and the needs expressed; thus, 75% of the funded projects dealt with social development, 16% with health, 7% with education and 2% with arts and culture. We also saw a preponderance of projects focusing on

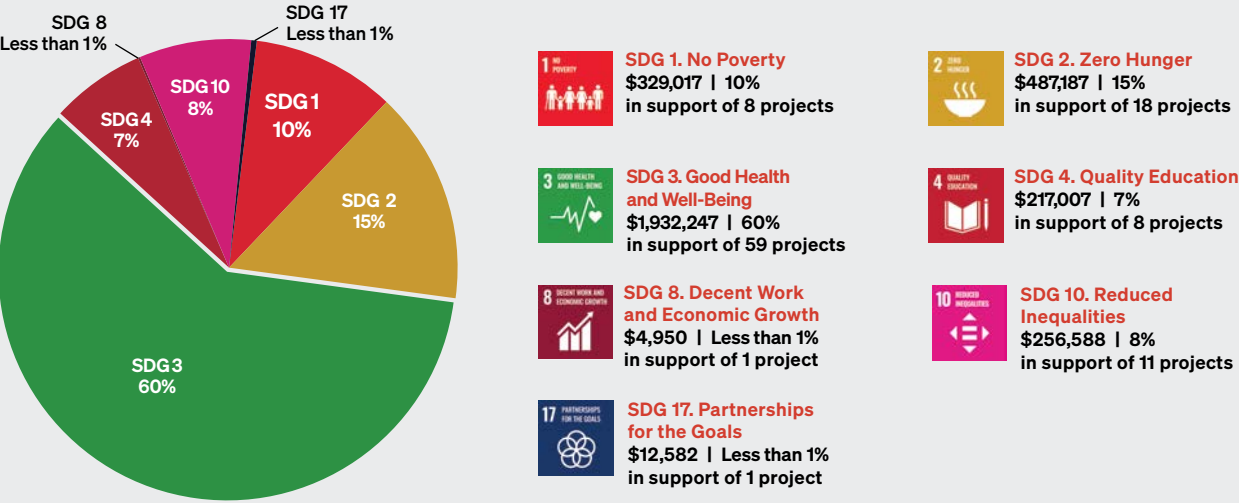
food security (28), psychosocial accompaniment (27), and day centres (17)**.

In order to be certain to bring aid to the most vulnerable populations, **FGM paid particular attention to marginalized populations or those needing a specific type of assistance***.** Nearly 65 % of the projects funded therefore targeted these groups. For example, 29 projects supported recent immigrants, 24 were to assist racialized communities, 15 focused on disabled individuals, and 12 were for persons experiencing homelessness**.

So as to respond to specific territorial issues stemming from the pandemic, FGM also acted complementarily to the Fonds COVID Québec (see following pages) and funded certain specific interventions that bolstered local action plans in nine neighbourhoods supported by that fund.

Maison de Lina

Maison de Lina is a shelter that was created to respond to the needs of women and children who have been victims of domestic violence. It provides welcome, safe shelter and support to these individuals. It also has produced many wide-ranging guidebooks for raising awareness of domestic violence; they have been translated into several languages so as to be accessible to immigrant women. It collaborates with other shelters and with CAVAC (Centre d'aide aux victimes d'actes criminels) in Laval to provide continuing education on domestic violence for police officers on patrol, and is involved in prevention activities in secondary schools and various organizations.

In phase 2 of the ECSF, Maison de Lina received a grant of \$5,051 for its regional domestic violence information and awareness raising project.

The organization had also received funding during phase 1 of the ECSF, in the amount of \$40,000, so as to be able to adapt its services to constraints imposed by the pandemic (purchasing disinfection equipment, hiring a cook, etc.).



Centre communautaire multi-ethnique de Montréal-Nord

The Centre communautaire multi-ethnique de Montréal-Nord fosters comprehension, dialogue and rapprochement between members of the cultural communities and those who populate their new home. In particular, it offers food aid services, translation, francization classes, and participation for its members in sociocultural activities. It offers services to adults, but also encourages young people to get more involved in community activities, and works as well to help break down the isolation of Montreal North's seniors.

Seeing vulnerable individuals and families facing growing needs during the pandemic, the Centre communautaire multi-ethnique de Montréal-Nord submitted a project proposal in phase 2 of the ECSF. The project was funded in the amount of \$34,118. It allowed for the hiring of a driver and delivery person who took care of bringing food supplies to persons in need who could not get to a food bank. These visits to the homes of the most vulnerable were also an opportunity to break down their isolation, to impart information and to distribute personal protective equipment.

Fonds COVID Québec, deployed by the COVID Québec Consortium

Created in March of 2020 by four of Montreal's major philanthropic families through their foundations (the Trottier Family Foundation, Fondation Mirella et Lino Saputo, the Molson Foundation and the Jarislowsky Foundation), in concert with Philanthropic Foundations Canada, **the COVID Québec Consortium supports effective action that can be of assistance to communities and public authorities in responding to the pandemic.**

Backing communities in their response to COVID-19

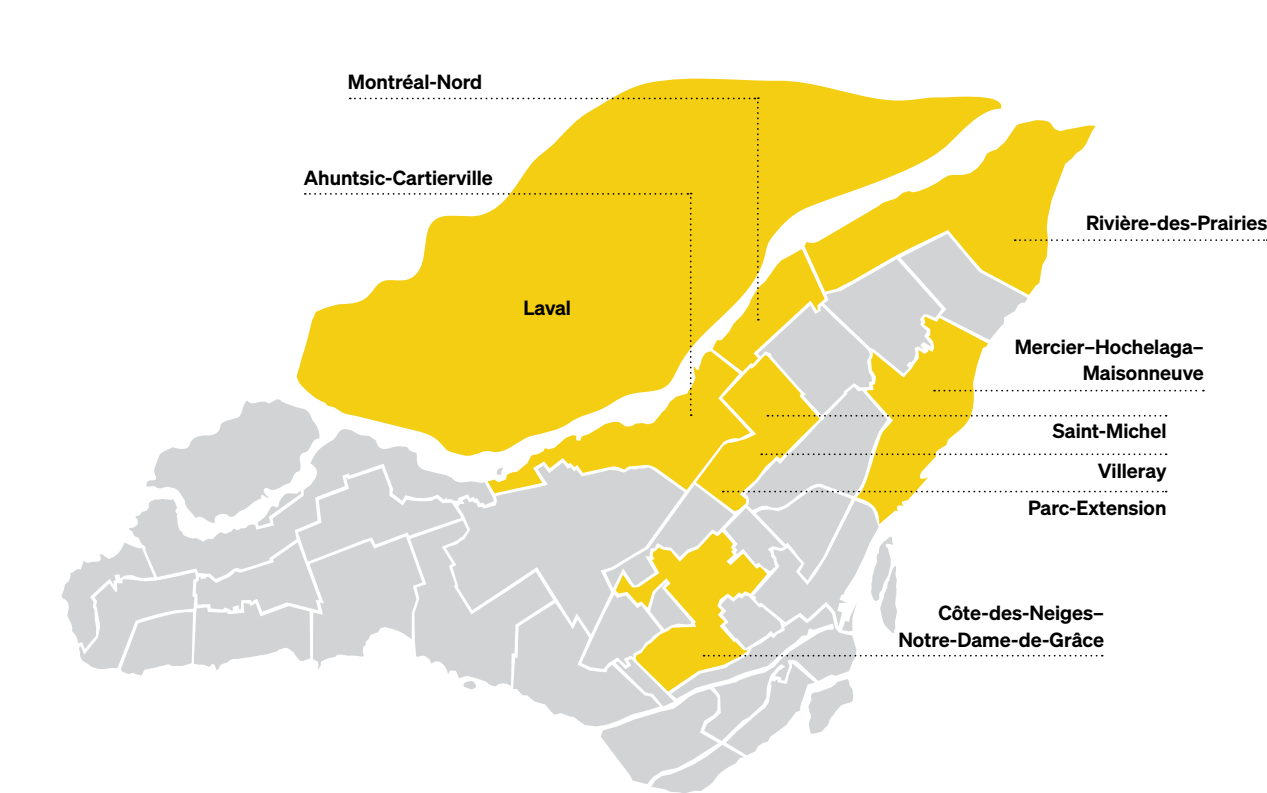
By the summer of 2020, the consortium was already providing support to local action plans developed in collaboration with the community sector, municipal governments and health authorities, with the Canadian Red Cross helping out as well. The Foundation of Greater Montréal joined the ranks of the Consortium at that point, contributing to the development of the action plans, and assisting in coordination. It also committed to backing these plans via the Emergency Community Support Fund, by allocating grants of \$75,000 in each of the nine neighbourhoods involved at that point.

These action plans were created by individuals on the ground, who were thus more likely to know the neighbourhoods, and the issues and populations within them. The goals were to inform the population on COVID-19 risks, protective behaviour and finding screening clinics, and to help them through periods of self-isolation necessitated by a positive test result. In the end, the objective was to protect the most vulnerable populations and to limit the spread of COVID-19.

In their first three months of deployment by 116 organizations and local leaders, these action plans helped more than 110,000 people. Nearly 12% of the people reached out to were steered towards financial or psychosocial assistance, including more than 1,200 elderly individuals. These actions helped prevent the spread of COVID-19, and also reinforced the social safety net.

This first phase of funding demonstrated the power that could be harnessed when Quebec's communities mobilized to face the pandemic. The action plans brought out the **importance of equipping and supporting local actors** in encouraging populations to go along with public health measures, and, ultimately, cut down on community transmission.

COVID-19 Côte-des-Neiges local action plan

The Côte-des-Neiges borough remained a hotspot for outbreaks, as measured by the Direction régionale de la santé publique's monitoring of COVID-19 by area in 2020. The Snowdon sector was especially hard hit by the pandemic, in addition to having a large proportion of individuals receiving food aid, and individuals with low incomes. The neighbourhood is, to a greater extent than many others, a place where new arrivals to Montreal make a home for themselves. These individuals sometimes have a limited grasp of the two official languages, which can make it challenging to transmit information to them via institutional communication networks. On top of that, many Snowdon residents are essential workers who live in dwellings where space is limited or that are densely populated. All the elements are in place for the virus to spread more widely.

The local COVID-19 action plan for Côte-des-Neiges, backed by the Fonds COVID Québec, led to the reinforcement of collaborations and the clarification of the roles and responsibilities of each of the actors, be they institutional or community-based, as well as the implementation of innovative and complementary projects to assist the most vulnerable and isolated populations.

Starting at the end of August, awareness workers crisscrossed the neighbourhood, giving out critical information. With the injection of new resources, interventions and activities emerged that had rarely, or not at all, been taken on by local institutions. For instance, the Côte-des-Neiges action plan allowed for the enhancement of communications tools, their translation into several languages, and their transmission via several platforms. Awareness workers informed residents about mobile screening clinics, and helped in the distribution of packages for those who had to self-isolate on an emergency basis. To mention but a few of the resources mobilized, and the impacts: distribution of 18,500 leaflets listing community resources; 20,394 masks and 248 isolation gowns provided to community organizations; 12,763 residents receiving person-to-person prevention or awareness information; the creation of a website; soundtracks for the "truck crier" which, armed with a loudspeaker, broadcast instructions in 18 languages; and 1,263 infected individuals receiving food packages that made their isolation periods easier. All of this helped limit community transmission in Côte-des-Neiges.

The COVID Québec Consortium will continue to support the community in 2021

The goal of the second phase, decided upon at the end of 2020 and to be put into practice in 2021, is to **apply the territorial model to all of the Island of Montreal, Laval and Longueuil**. This will be made possible by the participation of more than 250 community organizations. Since the deployment of action plans requires substantial investment, the foundations and their partners (Echo Foundation, Secrétariat à la région métropolitaine, CIUSSS du Nord-de-l'Île-de-Montréal) will contribute an additional sum of nearly \$4.2 million. By the end of the second phase, the consortium will have invested nearly \$7 million. The Foundation of Greater Montréal is pleased to have been chosen to manage the funds invested by the Molson, Trottier, and Mirella and Lino Saputo Foundations, while Philanthropic Foundations Canada will be monitoring the progress of action plans and helping move forward their implementation.

MOBILIZING FOR THE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS



In addition to the \$12 million disbursed by funds specifically geared to pandemic response, a total of more than \$21 million was distributed to organizations by nearly 320 FGM funds created by individuals, families, other organizations and businesses. On the following pages, you will read about just a few of the organizations and projects that were supported by FGM funds, based on the Sustainable Development Goals* that their work relates to. These SDGs were the ones that stood out as being priorities in the *Vital Signs of Greater Montreal* report, which means they are priorities in the community.

* Considering that arts and culture are just as vital to the health and well-being of a community, we have made that sector a priority alongside the SDGs.



SDG 1. NO POVERTY

The Collective Impact Project (CIP)

Since 2016, the Foundation of Greater Montréal, eight other major foundations and three strategic partners have supported the Collective Impact Project (CIP), an initiative launched by **Centraide of Greater Montreal**. CIP comes to the aid of local actors and initiatives that improve the well-being of residents in 17 Montreal neighbourhoods, including five where more intensive work is being done.

The foundations' collective commitment to disburse \$23 million over five years to back this strategic action has enabled the fight against poverty and exclusion to be carried out in a sustained fashion. It also helped develop communities that were more resilient and better organized when the COVID-19 crisis broke out. Faced with this exceptional situation, the CIP partners were able to rapidly pivot to allow more flexibility in the use of funds, as well as reallocation towards certain key priorities like food aid and support for families.

For several years now, Montreal has been Quebec's capital of child poverty.

Vital Signs 2020

In 2020, FGM confirmed its commitment to support phase 2 of CIP in the amount of \$200,000 per year; it will start in June of 2021 and continue for five more years.



SDG 2. ZERO HUNGER

The Zero Hunger in Montreal initiative

Spearheaded by FGM and carried out from 2018 to 2020, Zero Hunger in Montreal led to a better collective understanding of the food security ecosystem in the city, thanks to knowledge sharing among the actors, the promotion of collective action and the development of a strategic roadmap. Zero Hunger in Montreal's final report contained very clear findings: community organizations lack the infrastructure and the means to ensure sufficient, healthy and appropriate meals for Montrealers living with food insecurity.

In 2020, FGM kept up its fight against hunger, participating in round tables, and structuring its grants around the recommendations in the project's report. It supported several initiatives, both those that were strategic and those that provided immediate food aid, via the COVID-19 Collective Fund and the Emergency Community Support Fund, among other vehicles.

In particular, it made a grant to **La Cantine pour tous** in support of its program that seeks to provide affordable school meals to all primary school students. It also supported **Équiterre**, as well as the "Démarche pour une relance durable et la résilience du système alimentaire montréalais (Action for a sustainable recovery and for resilience in Montreal's food system)" of the **Conseil du système alimentaire montréalais (C-SAM)**.

To meet immediate needs — needs that were heightened by the pandemic — FGM also funded several organizations specializing in food security, such as the **Centre africain de développement et d'entraide**, in Pointe-Saint-Charles, and **Ressource Action-Alimentation Parc-Extension**.

Nearly 14% of Montrealers live in a situation of moderate or severe food insecurity.

Dans la rue

Founded in 1988, Dans la rue comes to the aid of youths who are homeless or in precarious situations. The causes and day-to-day realities of youth homelessness are different from those of adult homelessness; and so different solutions are needed. With dedication, empathy and respect, the organization tends to

their immediate needs and works with them so that they can acquire the competencies and resources they need in order to live fuller and more autonomous lives.

In practice, that means offering services like the Bunker, a secure emergency shelter for men and women, open every night; la Roulotte, a mobile operation that welcomes youths and gives them information on services offered; a day centre, offering specially adapted services, meals and constructive activities; as well as 17 permanent housing units for young people seeking a fresh start. All of these approaches offer the respite, listening, health care, support and security they need in order to be able to start building a future.

In 2020, Dans la rue received support from **Fonds Fondation Jean E. et Lucille Douville** and **Fonds Fondation Famille Morency**, as well as from the **Chamandy Foundation**, **Michael and Michaelleen O'Connor**, and **Beatrice Enid Patterson Foundation Funds**.

Montreal Diet Dispensary

Founded in 1879, the Montreal Diet Dispensary offers free nutritional and social support to pregnant women in precarious situations so as to equip them to give birth to healthy babies. From six months before birth to six months after, the organization provides individual nutritional counseling based on the Higgins method®, offers breastfeeding support and provides parents with pre- and post-natal group activities. The Diet Dispensary helps about 900 women, and their families, each year.

In 2020, the Montreal Diet Dispensary received funding from the **Fonds Fondation Paul-A. Fournier** and the **Fonds Fondation Jean E. et Lucille Douville**.

SDG 3. GOOD HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

Marie-Vincent Foundation

The Marie-Vincent Foundation wants to build a world free of sexual violence towards children and adolescents. To get there, it plays a role in developing a protective community that works to prevent sexual violence and to ensure the optimal development of all youth, including those who have been victims of sexual violence, and children presenting problematic sexual behaviour.

As well as being active in prevention and education, the Marie-Vincent Foundation helps children and young victims of sexual violence and their families get through their ordeal by providing specialized services that are effective and adapted to the needs of each individual. It also supports an interuniversity research Chair and several partners from various sectors, all across the province of Quebec.

In 2020, the Marie-Vincent Foundation received funding from the **Chamandy Foundation Fund** in the amount of \$200,000, for the provision of therapeutic care. FGM for its part helped it provide essential services virtually as well as assistance to young victims of sexual violence through the **COVID-19 Collective Fund**.

Habilitas Foundation

Habilitas is a Montreal foundation that dreams of a world where physical disabilities are no longer a source of problems. The Foundation raises funds for several service providers (including the Lethbridge-Layton-Mackay Rehabilitation Centre, Camp Massawippi, and the Action Centre) in order to make sure that individuals of all ages living with a physical disability receive the best possible rehabilitation. The Habilitas Foundation's mission is to optimize its clients' quality of life, while accompanying them in the realization of their full potential.

In 2020, the Habilitas Foundation was funded by several fund creators, such as the **Fonds Fondation Paul-A. Fournier**, the **Doggone Foundation Fund**, the **Anna and Philip Belec Foundation Fund**, and the **Beatrice Enid Patterson Foundation Fund**.

The Foundation's music program was supported by the **Chamandy Foundation Fund**, and the pediatric low vision clinic was supported by the **Malouf Family Fund**.

SDG 4. QUALITY EDUCATION

Montreal Fluency Centre

The Montreal Fluency Centre (MFC) assists children who present speech or language difficulties as well as learning differences, from pre-school age to adulthood. Working with parents, daycare educators and teaching staff in schools, the organization provides services to children who stutter or who have difficulties in communication, learning or reading. Using speech therapy and psychopedagogical approaches, it aims to diminish the risks and long-term consequences associated with these types of difficulties. As well, the Centre offers offsite services, for example group training, mentoring, and treatment.

In 2020, the MFC was the recipient of a \$15,000 grant from the **Malouf Family Fund**, and received support in the amount of \$5,000 in phase 1 of the **Emergency Community Support Fund** in order to adapt its services to the pandemic context. Indeed, despite the constraints imposed by COVID-19, MFC maintained its commitment to offering speech therapy and psychopedagogy services to youth and families, in many cases using telepractice.

SDG 5. GENDER EQUALITY

Pilot Fund for Gender Equality

Through its participation in the Pilot Fund for Gender Equality, launched in 2019 by the Equality Fund in concert with Community Foundations of Canada and the support of the federal government, the Foundation of Greater Montréal facilitated the disbursement in 2020 of **\$115,000 to eight organizations in the Montreal area.** **The funding supported the deployment of projects promoting gender equality.**

These projects meet needs by supporting frontline services, the defense of human rights, the fostering of equality, and strategic initiatives. They aim to bring power into the hands of women, girls, two-spirited individuals and variously gendered persons by supporting their leadership and their engagement in community initiatives.

One example is Black Girls Gather (A Book Club) which is aimed at young Black girls aged 12 to 18. Started up by the **West Island Black Community Association (WIBCA)**, the book club organizes discussions, film screenings, and creative writing workshops based on readings of texts by Black authors. Another project is the **Société Elizabeth Fry du Québec's** Contre les violences systémiques subies par les femmes incarcérées (Acting against systemic violence inflicted on incarcerated women).

Chez Doris Women's Shelter Foundation

The Montreal-based organization Chez Doris provides a day shelter, seven days a week, for women in difficulty. The house provides meals, respite, clothing, socio-recreational activities and practical assistance in a secure and accepting environment. As of this past year, it has been providing 24-hour service during the winter (from December 1, 2020 to March 31, 2021). Chez Doris offers a safe and judgment-free environment for all women in need, with a high level of confidentiality.

In 2020, Chez Doris was funded by the **Fonds Michael Novak 1**, phase 1 of the **Emergency Community Support Fund**, and the **COVID-19 Collective Fund**.

With a contribution of \$15,000 from the COVID-19 Collective Fund, Chez Doris was planning to house 25 homeless women by March 31, 2021. A housing and support services specialist worked on finding a place to live suited to the needs of each woman, and provided them with furniture, the deposit on the rent (if necessary) and a startup kit (cleaning products and a variety of other items), as well as any necessary followup help.

SDG 10. REDUCED INEQUALITIES

In 2020, the Foundation of Greater Montréal wanted to go beyond just making funding decisions, and undertake a self-examination of its own practices in relation to inequality. To that end, it created a **committee on justice, equity, diversity and inclusion** which, with the aid of experts, will study the issue and come up with a series of recommendations which FGM will then implement. This obviously is only a first step in a process that will help FGM go farther in its fight against racism and discrimination. This process will enable the Foundation to align its actions with its core values, and to respond more directly to the needs of all the communities that enrich, and are an essential part of, Greater Montreal.

With that in mind, FGM also participated in the **Groupe des Vingt**, a network of organizations committed to having diversified and innovative boards of directors. Initiated by Concertation Montréal, the program accompanies 20 groups in the Greater Montreal area, and provides them with support and tools to help them enrich the memberships of their boards of directors with experienced leaders from diverse backgrounds. A new cohort is formed each year. In order to be part of the Groupe des Vingt, a participating organization must have adopted an appropriate resolution, confirming its commitment. An initiative that was greeted with enthusiasm by the FGM's Board and its President and CEO!

FGM also developed a **partnership with the Réseau des entrepreneurs et professionnels africains (REPAF)**. Launched in October of 2020, this collaboration will strengthen ties between FGM and Greater Montreal's African community, consolidating and nurturing the bonds that exist between us.

As well, several FGM funds have as their mission the reduction of inequalities. Among these, we can cite the **Cactus Fund**, created near the end of 2019, the goal of which is to support marginalized communities, education and the environment. In 2020, the Cactus Fund supported the **Foyer pour femmes autochtones de Montréal**, **Maggie's: Toronto sex workers action project**, and **Santropol Roulant** (a meals on wheels program).

SDG 10. REDUCED INEQUALITIES

We should also mention the **RBC Future Launch Community Challenge**, which presented its first grant recipients in December of 2019. Along with an initiative that encourages the protection of the environment through artistic creation and outreach, FGM chose to support two projects seeking to highlight, and further the transfer of, Indigenous cultural practices in Kanéhsatà:ke and Kahnawà:ke. In 2020, the three project creators continued on with their work.



In order to help the **Foundation for Black Communities** get started, the Foundation of Greater Montréal allocated it a grant of \$30,000. That will facilitate a consultation it will carry out with organizations run by Black individuals and serving the Black community in Greater Montreal, as well as the translation of communications tools into French. One example is the report *Unfunded: Black Communities Overlooked by Canadian Philanthropy*, which was translated into French and published in December.

On November 16, 2020, the **Round Table on Black History Month** and the **Union United Church unveiled a mural paying tribute to Nelson Mandela**, a major world figure in the struggle for peace, social justice, human rights and equality for all. Created by visual artist Franco Égalité in collaboration with the MU organization and the help of Kevin Ledo, this commemorative mural celebrates Nelson Mandela's historic visit to Montreal, 30 years ago. FGM allocated a grant of \$5,000 towards the realization of the project, which marks a key point in Montreal's history and in the fight for human rights and civil rights.



Lastly, we will cite the «4C Connected Community to Curb COVID-19: Seniors component» of the **Socioeconomic Summit for the Development of Black Communities Youth (SdesJ in French)**, which was funded in the amount of \$75,000 by the Emergency Community Support Fund.

The SdesJ is an innovative network of 46 community organizations that has taken on a mission to play a part in Quebec's economic and social development, focusing specifically on the contributions of youths from Black communities. It brings together, most notably, actors from the Haitian, African, Caribbean and anglophone communities. The project that was supported aims to provide seniors aged 60 and over with assistance that will enable them to become digital citizens, thus contributing to their social and economic inclusion, while reducing the impact that the COVID-19 lockdown is having on them. In practical terms, seniors will get computers or tablets, technical support, and training on subjects as varied as using a computer, communicating by webconference, cyber security, fraud prevention, financial autonomy, and the use of online platforms for everyday operations. As well, monthly networking get-togethers, using the Zoom platform, will be organized to help break their isolation and enable participating seniors to interact with each other.



SDG 13. CLIMATE ACTION

In December, as the City of Montreal was unveiling its Climate Plan, in which FGM's own Karel Mayrand had played a role in as co-president of the Comité consultatif sur le climat, FGM announced the **creation of the Montreal Climate Partnership**.

Created in collaboration with the Trottier Family Foundation, and with the backing of the City, this independent initiative, which brings together institutional, economic, community and philanthropic actors, seeks to **mobilize key actors in the Montreal community to accelerate the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions**, and support the city in meeting the Climate Plan's targets.

In 2020, FGM also worked towards the implementation of its own **Collective Fund for Climate and Ecological Transition**, which was launched in early 2021. Its aim is to accelerate the fight against climate change, the development of adaptation and resilience, and the ecological transition in Greater Montreal. FGM and its partners will be able to enhance the funding available for foundational and innovative initiatives that fight climate change. The Fund will also bolster the capacities of organizations and grassroots groups committed to the transition.

Also in the category of the fight against climate change, the Foundation granted \$5,000 to the **Conseil régional de l'environnement (CRE) de Montréal** for J'embarque! Les rendez-vous de la mobilité durable (I'm on Board!; a sustainable mobility initiative). During all of September, J'embarque! provided varied programming that informed, mobilized and brought together several initiatives that highlighted collective and active forms of transportation, and the public, community and grassroots contributions to them.

ENvironnement JEUnesse

Created in 1979, ENvironnement JEUnesse (ENJEU) is an educational organization that seeks to raise awareness of environmental issues among Quebec youth, give them tools for action via its educational projects, and encourage them to act in their communities. ENvironnement JEUnesse is a network that emphasizes the development of critical thinking and lets engaged youth have their say, allowing them to voice their concerns, their points of view and their ideas for solutions on current environmental problems. Its citizen engagement activities and its educational projects cover several issues, including waste management, transportation, energy and climate, responsible consumption, water, and incorporating sustainable development principles into institutional and commercial settings.

Most notably, the organization puts together a major conference on the environment every autumn. It presents seminars, workshops and networking activities designed by, and aimed at, young people. Participants can learn, discuss among themselves and with guest environmental experts, and mobilize on climate issues.

ENJEU's Pour des écoles plus vertes (For Greener Schools) program will be

funded for three years — this past year having been the first — by the **Chamandy Foundation Fund**. The program, which targets primary and secondary schools of all sizes and in all types of settings in Quebec, provides accompaniment through the school year and ultimately a certification. Throughout the year, it promotes environmental education and the implementation of sustainable practices, at a pace which is appropriate for the school.

The organization was also funded by the **Beatrice Enid Patterson Foundation Fund** in 2020.

ARTS AND CULTURE

With more than \$150 per person annually, Montreal is the municipality that spends the most on culture in Quebec.

Pro Musica

Pro Musica's mission is to showcase and promote the excellence of musicians from here and abroad in order to bring classical music closer to the community. It serves as a stepping stone for young Quebec and Canadian artists by encouraging the emergence of tomorrow's great names.

Pro Musica forges lasting ties between emerging generations, established artists and the artistic community, through concerts, collaborations and arts programming. In doing so, it contributes to the development of musicians, to the advancement of the local music community, and to the democratization of classical music.

Pro Musica has its own fund at FGM, and in 2020 was also supported by the **Fonds Fondation Famille Lupien**.

PHILANTHROPY INCENTIVE PROGRAMS

As a promoter of a culture of philanthropy in Greater Montreal, FGM is notably a partner in programs that incentivize philanthropy in arts and culture as well as in sports.

Registered charitable organizations that operate in the targeted sectors can create a fund at FGM and submit requests to these programs for matching grants to bolster their fundraising efforts. These contributions help them develop and maintain the continuity of their activities.

Mécénat Placements Culture Program

This program aims to ensure the autonomy and financial security of non-profit organizations operating in the areas of culture and communications. It works towards the creation of permanent funds, and encourages these organizations to fundraise by offering a match on funds collected. The program's rules were modified in July of 2018.

As of December 31, 2020, this program was in operation for **405 funds** at FGM, representing a total value of \$144,660,389. In 2020, **57 new funds were created**.

In 2020, the **government of Quebec distributed \$6,067,881 in matching grants** to participating organizations' funds.

Fonds Galerie B-312

“To think back to when we began to imagine a brighter future: time flies! In 2010, when Galerie B-312 decided to participate in Mécénat Placements Culture, we needed be very determined to go ahead, because we knew we would have to wait for about 10 years in order to benefit from donations that we could really have used right away. But when we look at our investments at the Foundation of Greater Montréal today — they have nearly doubled — we now clearly see the amazing potential they held. Canadian Heritage Program

With the endowment incentives component of the Canada Cultural Investment Fund, Canadian Heritage encourages arts organizations to build new revenue streams. The federal government provides a funding incentive for donations, in the form of matching grants.

Between the creation of this component in 2001 and December 31, 2020, FGM funds of participating organizations have received \$13,676,428 in grants from Heritage Canada. That translates into a minimum amount of \$27,352,856 to be held in perpetuity in the Foundation's restricted assets for the **40 non-profit professional arts organizations** that are the beneficiaries of income generated by these investments.

In 2020, FGM managed **89 funds** within this program; **31 of them were created in 2020**. The **government of Canada disbursed \$1,860,805 in matching grants** to the FGM funds of participating organizations in 2020.

Mécénat Musica program

Mécénat Musica is a cultural program created in 2013 by donors, for donors. It encourages individuals to make an in-perpetuity donation of \$25,000 to a cultural organization that is important to them, and it encourages philanthropic families to match these individuals' donations with donations of \$250,000 or \$2,500,000. This initiative has brought a major change to the landscape of cultural philanthropy.

Mécénat Musica donations are all the more impactful since they boost the cultural organization's initial contribution with FGM prior to it making an application for a matching grant to Mécénat Placements Culture or Canadian Heritage.

In 2020, **six organizations' funds at FGM, including two new ones, were funded by this program**. During the year, a total of **\$2,403,287** (excluding governmental matches) **was deposited in the funds** of the six participating organizations.

As of December 31, 2020, **35 organizations** had been funded at FGM through this program since its creation.

Fonds Clavecin en concert – Luc Beauséjour à perpétuité

“Thanks to the creation of an in-perpetuity fund at the Foundation of Greater Montréal in 2015, Clavecin en concert (Harpsichord in concert) today has a solid financial base. Our organization benefits from the support of generous donors, and with matching grants from Mécénat Musica, Mécénat Placements Culture et Canadian Heritage, we can look to the future with confidence and optimism. With endeavours like public concerts, album recording, master classes for young musicians and partnerships with festivals and with other organizations, we are able to showcase harpsichord music here and abroad. We feel it is essential to ensure the continuity of Clavecin en concert.”

Programme Placements Sports

Placements Sports was created by Quebec's Ministère de l'Éducation et de l'Enseignement supérieur, which seeks to encourage the province's sports federations to build new revenue streams via fundraising campaigns. The program, run by Corporation Sports-Québec, includes an endowment fund creation component that ensures organizations' long-term sustainability.

As of December 31, 2020, FGM managed **62 funds, including one created in 2020**, within this program, with an overall capital of \$7,889,278 and a market value of \$9,409,621. In 2020, **\$848,376 was disbursed to participating sports federations' funds**.

Fonds Golf Québec

“Since its creation in 2012, the Placements Sports et Loisirs program, through the direct impact of matching grants, has enabled Golf Québec to invest in initiatives that help children and families discover the sport of golf. These funds have also contributed to the hiring of much-needed resources. We would like to recognize the long-term importance of the endowment fund managed by the Foundation of Greater Montréal, which allows us to guarantee financial stability as well as the ongoing viability of the initiatives in the Federation's strategic plan.”

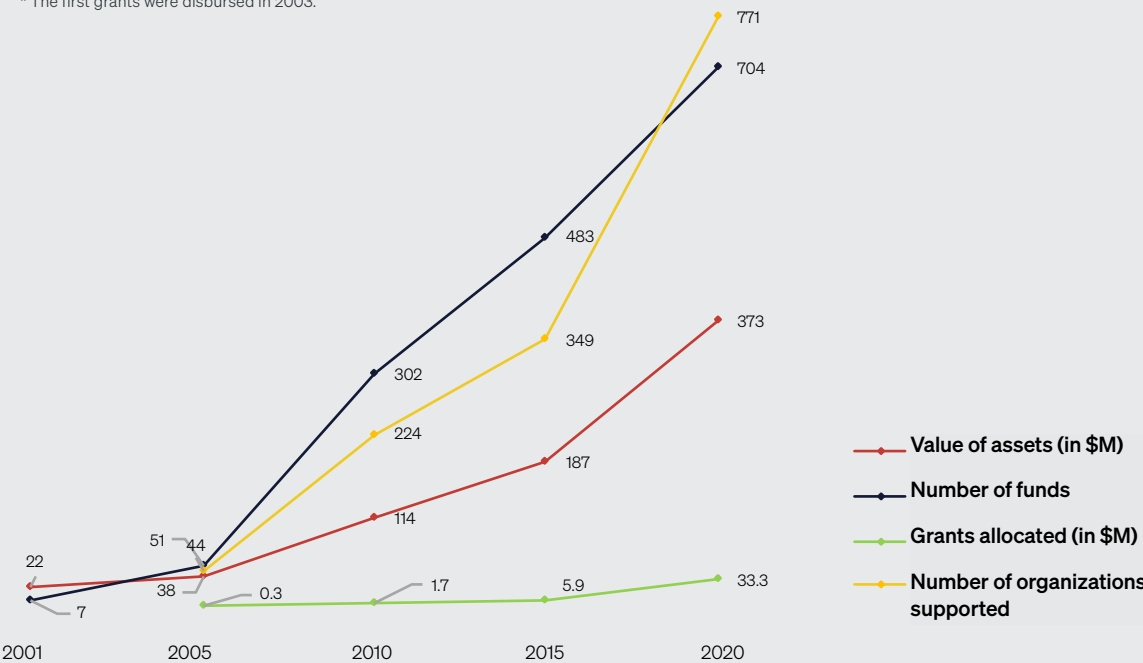
Quite a journey for FGM over 20 years

Since its creation in 2000, FGM has achieved a great deal. But what makes the Foundation’s story so extraordinary is that **it was built by and for the Greater Montreal community**. By dedicating itself to serving the community, it gradually became an indispensable institution in Montreal’s philanthropic landscape. And, of course, it is thanks to its donors, to its partners from all backgrounds, and the many organizations it has supported that FGM has been able, over time, to build this legacy for Greater Montreal.

The Foundation’s story is therefore the story of our entire community but also of the deep engagement of FGM donors and fund creators, whose generosity has enabled **foundational initiatives** to occur in every area of our collective life, and as a result, **to help in a very tangible way those who are working for the development and the well-being of the community** as a whole. Without this philanthropic and human «values chain», the Foundation of Greater Montréal could not have fully played its part, nor become what it is today.

Over 20 years, the total number of funds at FGM has multiplied a hundredfold, going from 7 to 704.

The assets under management, which already amounted to nearly \$22M after one year of FGM’s existence, are now up to more than \$373M. **The number of organizations FGM supports is also on the rise**, which reflects greater coverage of the needs that have developed in Greater Montreal. In 2020 alone, more than \$33.3M in grants were disbursed. **Over 20 years, grants distributed have totalled \$97.6M.**

We can all be proud to have come this far. We will reach \$100M in grants given out for the well-being of the community in 2021, an impressive milestone, and we are naturally also looking to the future. The year 2030 will be the next major signpost for the Foundation.

Celebrations

January 20, 2020 was the date chosen by FGM to celebrate its 20 years of existence. On this special occasion, a cocktail reception was held in the Hall of Bronzes at the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, based on the theme "I believe in philanthropy. I showcase my cause." To highlight the theme, FGM called on the MU organization and the artist Christian Robert de Massy to coordinate the **creation of a collective work of art**, to which guests could contribute as they wished by adding a message or a symbol representing a cause dear to them. This work of art now has a place of honour in the Foundation's offices.

More than 300 guests joined the celebration, including Sophie Mauzerolle, the City Councillor responsible for urban planning and mobility on the City of Montreal's Executive Committee. Ms. Mauzerolle addressed the gathering, as did the Chair of FGM's Board of Directors, the Hon. Jean-François de Grandpré, and the Foundation's then-President and CEO, Yvan Gauthier. This highly successful event brought together many Montreal-area philanthropists and builders, as well as Foundation partners and representatives of community organizations FGM has supported over the years, in all sectors, including arts, health, education and the environment

VITAL SIGNS OF GREATER MONTREAL

Vital Signs, a Community Foundations of Canada initiative, is the largest operation in data gathering on communities in the country. The *Vital Signs* reports are published by more than 65 community foundations across Canada. They assess the health of their cities, pinpointing major trends and, using key indicators, identify priority areas for action in sectors that are crucial to quality of life.

In publishing the *Vital Signs of Greater Montreal* report, the Foundation of Greater Montréal aims to **stimulate reflection and dialogue in our society and raise public awareness among Montrealers of immediate needs in the city, as well as of long-term challenges**. Structured around the **United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)**, our reports also guide donors, FGM fund creators, and all those who wish to focus their philanthropy on the most pressing needs.

Vital Signs of Greater Montreal 2020: A portrait of the city from 2000 to 2019

Another event marking its 20th anniversary was the production by FGM of a **special edition** in the *Vital Signs of Greater Montreal* series, created in collaboration with the Institut du Québec, which was tasked with researching and writing the report.

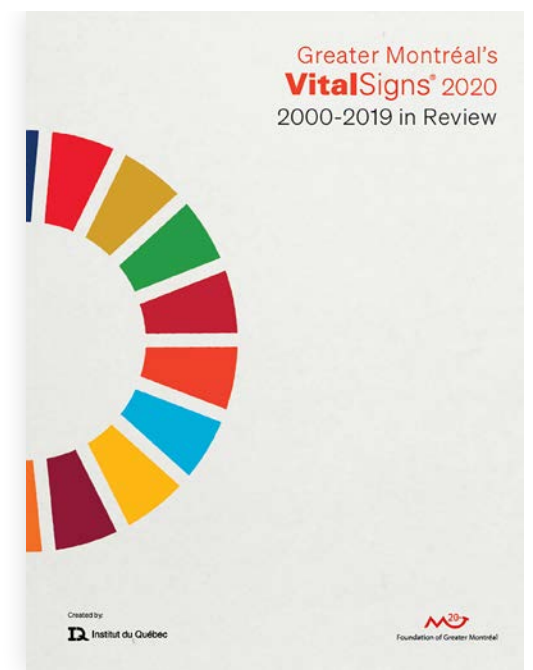
Its first part examines the city's current situation through the lens of the SDGs, and also looks at how things have evolved over the last 20 years. Even with the limitations inherent in the available data, this longitudinal examination allows the reader to understand the scope of both the successes and the challenges that have marked the early twenty-first century in Greater Montreal.

In the second part of the report, **a group of new leaders sets out their vision of what Greater Montreal could be in 2030**. Working in multiple sectors, these individuals are on the front lines of the Decade of Action, the United Nations' call to accelerate sustainable solutions to the world's challenges by 2030, the deadline for the achievement of the SDGs. Through their organizations' missions and projects, these young leaders allow us to imagine the landscape of the Greater Montreal of tomorrow.

Several of these experts also participated in FGM's **discussion forums around National Philanthropy Day** in November of 2020, which gave them an opportunity to share their experiences and respond to questions on an inclusive recovery and a sustainable economy.

The *Vital Signs of Greater Montreal 2020* report was launched June 9, 2020, in partnership with the Chamber of Commerce of Metropolitan Montreal (CCMM). Hosted by Michel Leblanc, the President and CEO of CCMM, the presentation was held online. Nearly 400 people tuned in for a presentation by Yvan Gauthier, then President and CEO of FGM. He reminded the audience that a major shift is needed in order for Greater Montreal be able to build a sustainable and resilient community, one whose health mirrors the economic successes it has had over the last few years.

FGM WELCOMES ITS NEW PRESIDENT AND CEO

Also in 2020, on June 22, Yvan Gauthier, who had headed FGM since 2013, passed the baton to his successor Karel Mayrand. Mr. Gauthier handed over the reins of Canada's sixth largest community foundation, having doubled its assets between 2014 and 2020. We owe a great deal to Yvan Gauthier: the deployment of extraordinary projects like Zero Hunger in Montreal, the renewal of the Vital Signs of Greater Montreal initiative through the integration of the Sustainable Development Goals, and the implementation of an innovative management structure, which has enabled the Foundation to truly embody its raison d'être and better fulfill its role as a leader in the philanthropic sector.

Karel Mayrand is a social entrepreneur, a renowned environmentalist and an effective communicator. At the Foundation, he will continue to exercise his brand of leadership, and work for the well-being of our community, by unifying and mobilizing the Greater Montreal community around the SDGs. A sustainable development advisor and Director General for Quebec and Atlantic Canada at the David Suzuki Foundation from 2008 to 2020, Mr. Mayrand has already started making a difference, and is now contributing to the momentum the Foundation has gathered while hitting its 20-year mark.

NEW COMMUNICATIONS AND VISIBILITY INITIATIVES FOR FGM

2020 was a year in which the Foundation of Greater Montréal had to demonstrate considerable agility and adaptability in a number of areas, given the COVID-19 pandemic. The communications unit was not spared that challenge, especially since this was supposed to have been a festive year, coinciding with FGM's 20th anniversary.

Numerous events and celebrations were either cancelled or reworked, most notably our Annual General Meeting (AGM) and Investment Fund Financial Review Meeting, which for the first time ever were virtual events, in May. While the AGM turned out to be a closed-door session for the Board of Directors, the meeting on the FGMIF's financial statements review drew an audience of nearly 50 on Zoom. **Several webinars and events were also devised over the course of the year**, notably for the Emergency Community Support Fund in July, but also for the launch of the *Vital Signs of Greater Montreal* report in June, and for National Philanthropy Day in November. An event to highlight the first anniversary of the Jean E. Douville bursaries also went online, with student recipients and university representatives attending and having the chance to chat with their benefactors, Mr. and Mrs. Douville.

FGM's media strategies bore fruit in 2020: **The Foundation was mentioned 396 times in the media.** Karel Mayrand's arrival in the President and CEO's chair in particular has drawn a great deal of media coverage since the summer of 2020. Whether it was, for example, for his many open letters published in *La Presse*, *L'Actualité* or *Montréal Centre-Ville*, his interventions regarding the City of Montreal's 2020-2030 Climate Plan and on the ECSF, or his co-signing of a letter by the friends of the Collectif petite enfance, Karel Mayrand wound up being mentioned 66 times in the media between his arrival at FGM and the end of the year.

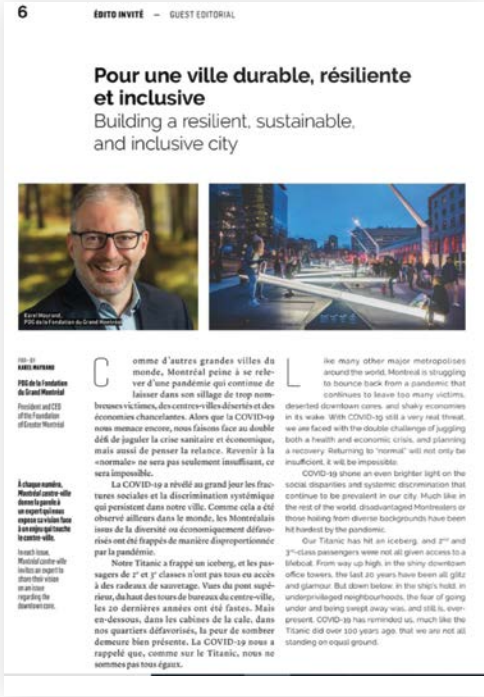
The Foundation of Greater Montréal's collaboration with the Atypic agency continued with a **revamp of FGM's website**. Several key stages have been successfully managed, like photo and design approval and the rewriting of all of the content in French and in English. The new site will be more user-friendly for fund creators and organizations, but also for financial advisors.

In order to ensure that FGM's communications are consistent, the **monthly newsletter was also revamped** so as to match the new website design. As well, a new editorial plan refocused the newsletter so that each monthly installment deals with a topic that is current, following the model of the alignment with SDGs in *Vital Signs of Greater Montreal*.

FGM's social media flourished in 2020, notably:

-  LinkedIn, on which it acquired 980 new followers with 275 posts, which got 92,000 impressions.
-  Facebook, the outlet on which we have the most followers, also showed growth, as we picked up 425 new followers, and produced 305 posts yielding 73,000 impressions.
-  Finally, Twitter is where we have our largest reach, with 260,000 impressions for 440 posts and 241 new followers in 2020.

PROMOTING PHILANTHROPY

The Foundation of Greater Montréal also has a mission to promote the use of philanthropy as a key driver in improving the well-being of Greater Montreal, bringing together the community's leaders and to facilitating the discovery of innovative and sustainable solutions to meet the community's challenges. To that end, it acts in multiple ways throughout the year. Here are several of our actions, presented in chronological order.

In January of 2020, the Foundation of Greater Montréal collaborated with the Chantier de l'économie sociale, as Tasha Lackman, our Vice President of Philanthropy and Community, became a member of the **Investment Readiness Program (IRP)'s Steering Committee**. Funded by the Government of Canada, the IRP aims to support organizations transitioning to increase the social impact of their actions, and needing to make investments in the years ahead. The steering committee oversees the framework for the IRP's deployment in Quebec, including admissibility criteria and project evaluation criteria. The **Initiative Immobilière de Montréal**, acting through Montreal's Neighbourhood Round Tables Coalition, was funded by the IRP in the amount of \$230,040. Their project seeks to create a vast enterprise for reflection and intervention on the use of real estate for community purposes. An urgent need for spaces has been voiced by the community sector, this shortage resulting from rising rents for non-profit organizations and the repossession of several affordable premises by certain private owners or by school boards.

On January 12, 2020, to mark FGM's 20th anniversary, Yvan Gauthier, then President and CEO of the Foundation, was Elysia Bryan-Baynes's guest on **Focus Montréal**, broadcast on Global Montreal. Mr. Gauthier spoke in particular about FGM's role in the community over the past 20 years.

The Foundation, via Tasha Lackman, is proud to have become a member of the **PhiLab Management Committee**. Since its beginnings, PhiLab, the Canadian Philanthropy Partnership Research Network, has been a centre for collaborative research, information sharing and the mobilization of knowledge about philanthropy. The committee FGM sits on monitors the overall direction of the project, and validates work plans and the operating budget. It assists on major events and mobilizes its resources to support data collection and the transmission of research results.

In May of 2020, as the COVID-19 pandemic was in full swing, Tasha Lackman also participated in a **study at Carleton University in Ottawa** that invited 22 leaders from private and community foundations from across Canada to contribute their views on *Le travail des Fondations à l'heure de la COVID-19 (Foundations' role in a time of COVID-19)*. The goal of the study was to understand the challenges faced, and the adjustments made, by foundations in responding to COVID-19 and to the societal issues it raised. This collaboration occurred over three sessions, in May, July and September of 2020.

With a view to assisting departments in the City of Montreal in their own search for innovative solutions, Tasha Lackman also sits on the **steering committee of the City of Montreal's Laboratoire**

d'innovation urbaine (LIUM). This lab is an experimentation ground for Montreal residents, businesses, city staff and city partners. All are invited to imagine, co-create and try out solutions that are innovative and geared to meeting the challenges of the future. LIUM activities touch on food supply, mobility, the digital universe, the use of data and regulatory experimentation.

On June 18, 2020, Yvan Gauthier participated in a **news conference held by the Marché solidaire Frontenac**. The event was held to launch the Carte proximité : fermière et solidaire. This new prepaid magnetic card is part of a program that aims to enhance food security, and support local farmers and businesses. FGM is proud to have participated in this project as part of its Zero Hunger in Montreal initiative, in partnership with the Carrefour alimentaire Centre-Sud, the City of Montreal and the crowdfunding platform La Ruche.

On October 14, 2020, **Épisode**, a consulting firm specializing in philanthropy and community investment, **unveiled its seventh Étude sur les tendances en philanthropie (Study of trends in philanthropy)**. This report has become a reference for non-profit organizations and for businesses. This past year, the report dealt with trends in philanthropy among individuals, SMEs and big businesses, but also included an overview of the effects of the pandemic on Quebecers' generosity. As a



longtime partner in the production of the report, the Foundation of Greater Montréal participated in the launch via short videos in which Karel Mayrand, President and CEO of FGM, addressed challenges in philanthropy that arose or will arise between 2020 and 2022.



On October 18, 2020, Lise Charbonneau, our Vice President of Administration, Finance and Investments, was **interviewed on Radio Canada International (RCI)** and spoke about FGM's partnership with **Mécénat Musica**. She pointed out in particular the contribution culture makes to a healthier society, and the fact that it is especially important in a pandemic.

The renown and expertise of FGM's new President and CEO led to the Foundation obtaining a seat on a variety of City of Montreal committees. Thus, Karel Mayrand sits on the **advisory committee on urban planning, mobility and the ecological transition of the City of Montreal**. This committee's goal, among others, is to identify the issues and possible solutions in the areas of urban planning, mobility and ecological transition that would be the most helpful both in maintaining quality of life in the city and in maintaining the city's attractiveness once the economic recovery begins. The committee will support the city in the development of its urban plan, which includes planning for mobility.

For the eighth edition of **National Philanthropy Day organized by FGM**, it joined forces with the Institut Mallet in order to further thinking about the future of philanthropy and the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals in Quebec, as we enter the Decade of Action and approach 2030. This partnership yielded two webinars, held on November 5 and 12, entitled «For the recovery of Greater Montreal: Future leaders in philanthropy mobilize!».

These two online discussions gave the floor to several individuals in the next generation of community leaders who had participated in Vital Signs of Greater Montreal. The first event, focusing on an inclusive recovery, drew nearly 100 people, while the second, which addressed the theme of a sustainable economy, attracted an audience of more than 65 viewers.

For 35 years now, November 15 has been National Philanthropy Day throughout Canada. That was the occasion for Philanthropic Foundations Canada's (PFC) invitation to FGM President and CEO Karel Mayrand to part of its **special panel on climate change and the attainment of the SDGs**, "Philanthropie en mouvement : front commun vers l'Agenda 2030" (Philanthropy in action: forging a common front on the 2030 agenda). With a panel that also included other important actors in the fight against climate change, such as André-Yanne Parent of the Climate Reality Project Canada, Charles Beaudry of Alliance 2030, and Claire Trottier of the Trottier Family Foundation, the event drew more than 100 spectators.

Since Montreal's 375th anniversary in 2017, the Foundation of Greater Montréal has supported Fusion Jeunesse in awarding the **Bourses Leaders MTL**, which recognize academic perseverance and engagement on the part of young people. FGM's President and CEO was a member of the jury and participated in the announcement of the winners on December 16, 2020.

Tasha Lackman sits on the **advisory committee on social solidarity in an inclusive recovery for Montreal**. This committee explores the social issues that need to be considered in efforts to further Montreal's economic recovery, and coordinates the efforts of various social and economic partners in the city, with a view to tackling the social inequalities that were exacerbated during the COVID-19 crisis.

Marie-Andrée Farmer, who is the Director for COVID-19 and Federal Funds - Community Engagement, represented FGM in November of 2020 as a **member of the jury for the Excellence in Philanthropy Awards of the Association of Fundraising Professionals (AFP)**, as well as sitting on the jury choosing projects for the **Civic Incubator of the Maison de l'innovation sociale**. That program aims to prototype and nurture ideas for projects with social and environmental impact, conceived by citizens or activist groups.



THANK YOU TO THE FUND CREATORS WHO PLACED THEIR TRUST IN FGM IN 2020

For philanthropy to have an impact, it requires, above all, the personal involvement of hundreds of donors and fund creators.

The Foundation of Greater Montréal manages 704 funds created by individuals, families, foundations, community organizations and businesses. Each has its own story; each creator has a motivation and a cause they wish to support.

In 2020, 89 funds were created; we thank their creators for the confidence they showed in us. Here are portraits of some of them.

Fonds Jacques Parizeau

Jacques Parizeau (1930-2015) was an economist by training, and in turn, a professor, a high-ranking civil servant and a politician; Quebec's Minister of Finance, and finally, Premier. One of the major standard-bearers of the Quiet Revolution, Jacques Parizeau was a pioneer in the construction of the modern state; the version developed in Quebec came to be known as the "Quebec model". Jacques Parizeau was a major player in the development of Quebec's economy and in the emergence of "Québec Inc.", the province's influential array of home-grown companies. All through his life, the education of future generations was a cause that was close to his heart. To ensure that his memory will live on, Ms. Lisette Lapointe, Mr. Robert Parizeau and Mr. Jean-Martin Aussant created the Fonds Jacques Parizeau at the Foundation of Greater Montréal in 2020. The goal of the fund is, first, to produce a commemorative monument to be located on the grounds of Quebec's National Assembly, but also to support the various causes Jacques Parizeau truly cared about, such as social development, arts and culture, the protection of the environment and access to education.

GSC Community Impact Funds

Last December, the Foundation of Greater Montréal and Green Shield Canada (GSC) announced a partnership aimed at increasing access to mental health care and dental care in the community. To make this happen, Green Shield Canada, via its Social Impact Program, created two GSC Community Impact Funds at FGM, one with a two-year term, and the other an in-perpetuity fund.

Over the next two years, the funds will support, in particular, services to the community offered by McGill's Faculty of Dentistry, which provides free or reduced-cost dental care to vulnerable individuals, at fixed locations and mobile clinics. In an effort to meet the needs of vulnerable youth with mental health issues, the GSC Community Impact Funds will also support, among other organizations, Head & Hands. Head & Hands accompanies marginalized youth, using an inclusive approach based on harm-reduction. The organization seeks to improve their physical and mental well-being through several services. Project 10 will also be supported: It works to "promote the personal, social, sexual and mental well-being of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, transsexual, two-spirit, intersex and questioning (2LGBTQ+) youth and adults between 14 and 25 years of age".

Through this agreement with GSC, FGM joins 12 other community foundations participating in GSC's Social Impact Program across Canada. GSC is the fourth largest provider of health and dental insurance in the country, offering its services to nearly four million clients.



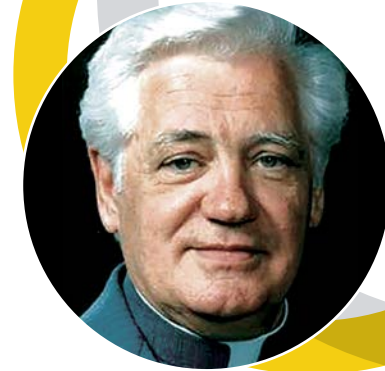
Fonds Fondation Lucien Ouellet, created by bequest

On November 24, 2020, Abbot Lucien Ouellet, who had been the chaplain for the Sûreté du Québec, passed away at the age of 97. A native of Saint-Léon-le-Grand in Matapédia, he entered the Grand Séminaire in 1945, and was ordained a priest on June 12, 1949. He was the vicar at Saint-Odilon-de-Cranbourne, in the parish of Saint-Pierre and Saint-Paul in Baie-Saint-Paul, as well as at Sacré-Cœur-de-Jésus in Pointe-au-Pic, then in the parishes of Saint-Roch and Notre-Dame-de-Jacques-Cartier. In 1963, he became the chaplain for the Institut de Technologie de Québec, then chaplain for the provincial police at the Quebec City prison for men and the Notre-Dame-de-la-Merci shelter, and in 1965, the chaplain for the Quebec City Fire Brigade. He was subsequently the chaplain for the provincial police force, the Sûreté du Québec, until his retirement.

Mr. Ouellet wished to leave something to the community through the creation of a philanthropic fund in his will. This type of planned gift allows a fund creator to leave their mark and pass on the values that are near and dear to them, without compromising their current financial status.

Subsequent to his passing, the Fonds Fondation Lucien Ouellet is going to be created at the Foundation of Greater Montréal and will enable support to be given out in the areas he wanted to promote and encourage.

Fonds REGAIN Santé

The REGAIN clinic (formerly known as the Physergo clinic) was a Verdun non-profit organization. Through its interdisciplinary team, the clinic offered services that enhanced the health and well-being of the area's population for more than 30 years. It received numerous honours, for example the title of exceptional corporate citizen for its 25 years of involvement in Verdun and in southwest Montreal, as well as recognition from the Fondation du développement local de Verdun for its exceptional contribution to the community (1992 to 2006).

While it closed for good in December of 2020, the clinic nonetheless wanted to pursue its community mission by transforming itself into a philanthropic organization. By creating the Fonds REGAIN Santé at FGM, the fund's constituents wanted to support projects carried out by organizations essentially located in the Verdun/Nun's Island borough, and enable them to offer services to vulnerable groups, notably in the three areas the clinic specialized in: physical rehabilitation, recuperation during and after cancer, and developing a healthy lifestyle.

The Fonds REGAIN Santé has already been able to support community actors in its borough, by allocating nearly \$41,000 to the Fondation Champlain et Manoir-de-Verdun for the renovation of a residential home dining room.

Fonds Fondation Serge Lecompte

An engineer by training, and holder of a degree in electric engineering from Queen's University, Serge Lecompte worked in the construction industry before acquiring A. Lecompte & Fils inc., his father and uncle's construction firm, which had been created by his grandfather in 1933. The company was therefore passed down from father to son over three generations. Until the mid-1970s, it focused on the residential and commercial sectors; then, around 1975, the firm moved in a different direction, and began taking on work in the industrial sector.

Now retired, Mr. Lecompte is a philanthropist and the president of 129127 Canada Inc., a Salaberry-de-Valleyfield management firm created in December of 1983.

In 2020, he realized his ambition of creating a philanthropic fund. The Fonds Fondation Serge Lecompte will allow him to support organizations active in a variety of fields.

Fonds Fondation Foisy Bernier

A graduate of HEC Montréal in business administration, Jacques Foisy is a chartered Professional accountant (CPA, CA). He started his career at KPMG in Montreal, then worked for Groupe Olympia, a meat processing company that today is known as Olymel. Since 1994, he has worked at Novacap, one of the most prominent buyout and growth equity firms, with more than six billion dollars in assets under management; he is Chairman of the Board and Managing Partner – Industries. He sits on the boards of directors of many of Novacap Industries' portfolio companies.

For Mr. Foisy, people helping each other is nothing new: "Give back, and share: that's how I was brought up." While still a child, he was impressed by his parents' community involvement. Even though they weren't wealthy, they made charitable donations, and his mother, on top of taking care of six children, was involved in non-profit associations. As an adult, Mr. Foisy also donated to a variety of causes. As his career progressed, he developed closer ties to several associations, kept up with their activities, and increased his donations.

His philanthropic approach led him to create a fund at FGM with his spouse, Chantal Bernier, in 2020. The Fonds Fondation Foisy Bernier was created through a PearTree Financial share issue — FGM is accredited with PearTree. Mr. Foisy and Ms. Bernier will be able to support several sectors and organizations they have chosen. They are delighted to be able to help the causes that are close to their heart.

Donations in support of FGM's operations

As we mentioned, in 2020, FGM funds and partnerships supported 771 organizations. Report of the Board of Directors

In 2020, which was the next-to-last year for the application of the 2018-2021 Strategic Plan, the Board of Directors held nine meetings. The directors examined several files relating to the development, funding, and reach and visibility of FGM, all of this against the background of the COVID-19 pandemic. Most notably, they achieved the following:

- Approved annual work plans for the committees of the Board, as well as budgets and financial statements for FGM and the FGM Investment Fund;
- Continued work geared towards attaining goals set out in the 2018-2021 Strategic Plan (United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals);
- Amended FGM's by-laws and proposed the adoption of the amendments at FGM's Annual General Meeting;
- Proceeded to the recruitment of a new President and CEO, and organized the transition from the outgoing President and CEO;
- Approved FGM's new structure;
- Contributed to the creation of new partnerships on major FGM projects;
- Continued the analysis and implementation of a risk management procedure for FGM;
- Formed a committee on justice, equity, diversity and inclusion, with a mandate to examine all aspects of systemic racism, specifically to examine FGM policies and practices in the community and internally;
- Created a working group on responsible investment;
- Recruited three new directors from ethnically diverse backgrounds.

I want to offer my sincerest thanks to the directors whose service with the Board ended in 2020: Lauréanne Fontaine and Pierrette Wong. I also want to thank the currently serving directors, whose respective skills continuously contribute to FGM's growth and to the achievement of its mission.

INVESTMENT COMMITTEE

Report of the Investment Committee

The Foundation of Greater Montréal Investment Fund (FGMIF)'s assets totalled \$337.3M as of December 31, 2020, up \$30.9M over the previous year. The increase is the result of the following: net realized investment income of \$24.1M, a net withdrawal of \$1.9M (gross contributions of \$26.7M and withdrawals of \$28.6M) and an unrealized change in the fair value of investments of \$8.7M. The FGMIF'S gross return on investment for 2020 was 11.33%, and the annualized five years return was 8.42%. Among the FGMIF's investments, two out of seven actively managed funds outperformed their benchmark indices, while indexed funds, in general, performed at the same level as their benchmark indices. The real estate fund added stability to our portfolio, producing solid income and showing an increase in value on some properties. When we add FGM assets managed outside of the FGMIF, overall assets total \$373M.

In order to achieve the FGMIF's objective of generating the necessary return on investment to ensure philanthropic distributions, while covering expenditures needed for sound management, and preserving in part the purchasing power of the capital, the committee focused its attention on monitoring the performance of the portfolio, and reviewing its investment policy.

In 2020, in addition to overseeing the application and the evolution of its investment policy, the committee met with the main investment fund managers, evaluated the external investment manager and made a recommendation to the Board of Directors regarding an appropriate payout ratio. This rate was based on the 2020 investment performance, but also on reserves accumulated over the last few years; it took into account the difficult times organizations went through in this turbulent year, while nonetheless keeping in mind what will be needed for future distributions. The Board ratified the committee's recommendation at its session of December 9, 2020.

I thank all the committee members who actively participated in our committee's work in 2020; we held five meetings in the year.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Report of the Community Engagement Committee

It almost goes without saying that the Committee's year was dominated by the ramifications of the COVID-19 pandemic, and by FGM's response to the crisis. In 2020, distributions from the Foundation's own funds combined with those from emergency funds we administered totalled \$33.3 million, and benefited 771 different organizations or projects. The funds were mainly used in support of the vulnerable groups that were the hardest hit by the pandemic, such as racialized individuals, Indigenous persons, women, people living with disabilities, young people or the elderly. With FGM's assistance through the year, frontline community organizations were able in particular to enhance food security, provide emergency shelter, break down social isolation, accompany those who were at greater risk of contracting COVID-19 and promote adherence to public health directives.

In this eventful year, we also thought about ways to better integrate inclusion and equity into our granting programs. Quite often, the groups that are the most vulnerable are also the ones that are neglected or underserved in terms of funding, even by the philanthropic sector. The COVID-19 crisis brought this ongoing reality to light, and has forced us to do better. In order to improve our response to the community's needs, we need to do more listening. We are now seeking to incorporate the results of our thinking process into our practices in an enduring way.

2020 was marked by collaborations with partners both old and new. FGM distributed more than \$10 million in the community via the Emergency Community Support Fund (ECSF), funded by the federal government, in concert with Centraide of Greater Montreal and the Canadian Red Cross. Thanks to the COVID Québec Consortium, we also worked with several private foundations so as to support action plans to fight COVID-19 on a community level across our territory.

Right at the start of the pandemic, FGM also mobilized its donors and its network to create its own COVID-19 Collective Fund. This rapid and direct response in aid to the Greater Montreal community will now continue over the longer term thanks to the subsequent creation of the Collective Fund for Recovery, which, in the same spirit of equality and inclusion, will work for a lasting and sustainable post-COVID rebuilding in the community sector. Overall, then, 2020 was a year in which the Engagement Committee was pushed to develop new competencies and new methods that, in the future, will make our interventions in the community more effective, and allow us to better embody our raison d'être and achieve our mission. I wish to thank the members of the Committee for their dedication all through this very demanding year.

AUDIT COMMITTEE

Report of the Audit Committee

Since its creation, FGM has committed itself to maintaining standards of excellence both in financial management and in accountability. It is through the Audit Committee that the Board of Directors ensures the continuation of best practices in governance in these areas.

The Audit Committee is currently composed of six individuals: five members of the Board and one external member.

The Committee met six times in 2020, notably for followup on FGM's and FGMIF's quarterly and annual financial results (including the process involved in their preparation, and periodic monitoring of the budget) and to move forward on the following files: implementation of the work plan on cybersecurity, updating of the policy on the delegation of powers, the Risk Management dashboard and continuity planning of operations, and evaluation of the auditor.

COVID-19

The committee kept a particularly close watch on the financial and organizational risks stemming from the health crisis. Management presented sensitivity analyses to the committee that considered a variety of scenarios for return on investment and cost reductions. The committee also monitored organizational change and impacts on internal controls, in particular as concerned the implementation of electronic payment and telecommuting. The committee was satisfied with the analyses put forward by management and with the measures put in place to ensure the maintenance of rigorous internal control mechanisms.

The Foundation's financial results for 2020 are excellent, in that they surpass budget goals and show an excess of revenues over expenditures of \$29M. New contributions received and a good performance on the markets resulted in FGM's investments increasing in value from \$213M to \$244M for the period ending December 31, 2020. If we add to FGM's investments those that it manages on behalf of other organizations, the funds managed by the Foundation total \$373M as of December 31, 2020, an increase of nearly \$28M from the previous year. Thanks to the confidence our donors placed in us, complemented by government programs, contributions to FGM were up to nearly \$46M in 2020.

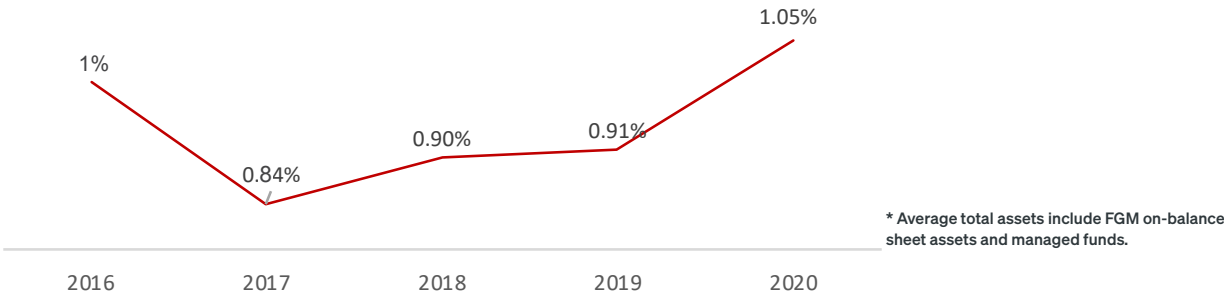

GOVERNANCE AND HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE REPORT

Report of the Governance and Human Resources Committee

The Governance and Human Resources Committee held eight meetings in 2020. During the year, the Committee most notably:

- Supported FGM's leadership in its management of COVID-19, in particular through (i) the drafting of a back-to-work protocol, (ii) ensuring recognition for employees who worked extra hours during the first months of the pandemic, and (iii) the implementation of a summer hours policy;
- Ensured appropriate welcome and support for the new President and CEO;
- Recommended the adoption of a new leadership structure for FGM;
- Carried out an evaluation of the effectiveness of the Board of Directors, its committees and the President and CEO;
- Established competency profiles for the Board's directors, and worked on a succession plan for the directors;
- Proceeded to the recruitment and confirmation of candidates for the Board of Directors;
- Carried out a survey on engagement and satisfaction levels among FGM employees;
- Recommended to the Board of Directors a review of FGM's administrative by-laws, particularly as concerns the holding of Board meetings via videoconference and the modification of term lengths for the directors and the Chair of the Board.

FGM: SOME KEY NUMBERS

20 years of philanthropy and engagement for Greater Montreal

In 20 years, the number of FGM funds and FGM-managed funds has gone up a hundredfold, from 7 to 704. Its assets, which already stood at nearly \$22 million after only one year of activity, now have exceeded \$373 million.

The number of organizations benefiting from FGM support also continues to grow, which indicates improved coverage of the obvious needs in Greater Montreal, on the North Shore and in Montérégie, as well as an increase in the total amount of funds available for distribution.

In 2020 alone, an amount of more than \$33.3 million in grants was disbursed. Over the last 20 years, the total of grants disbursed comes to more than \$97.6 million.

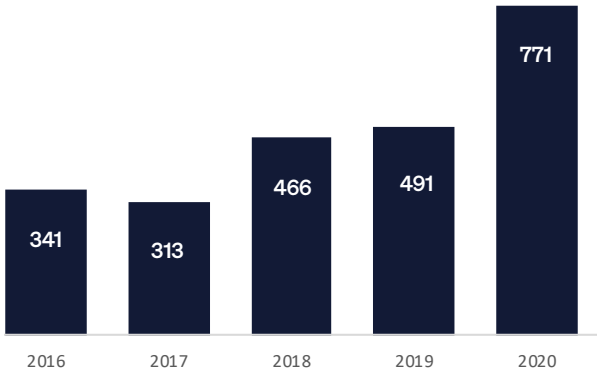
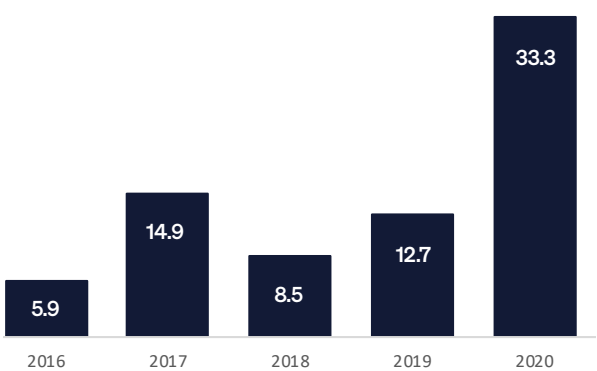
More than \$33.3 million granted for the SDGs and culture in 2020

Total of grants given out, in millions of dollars

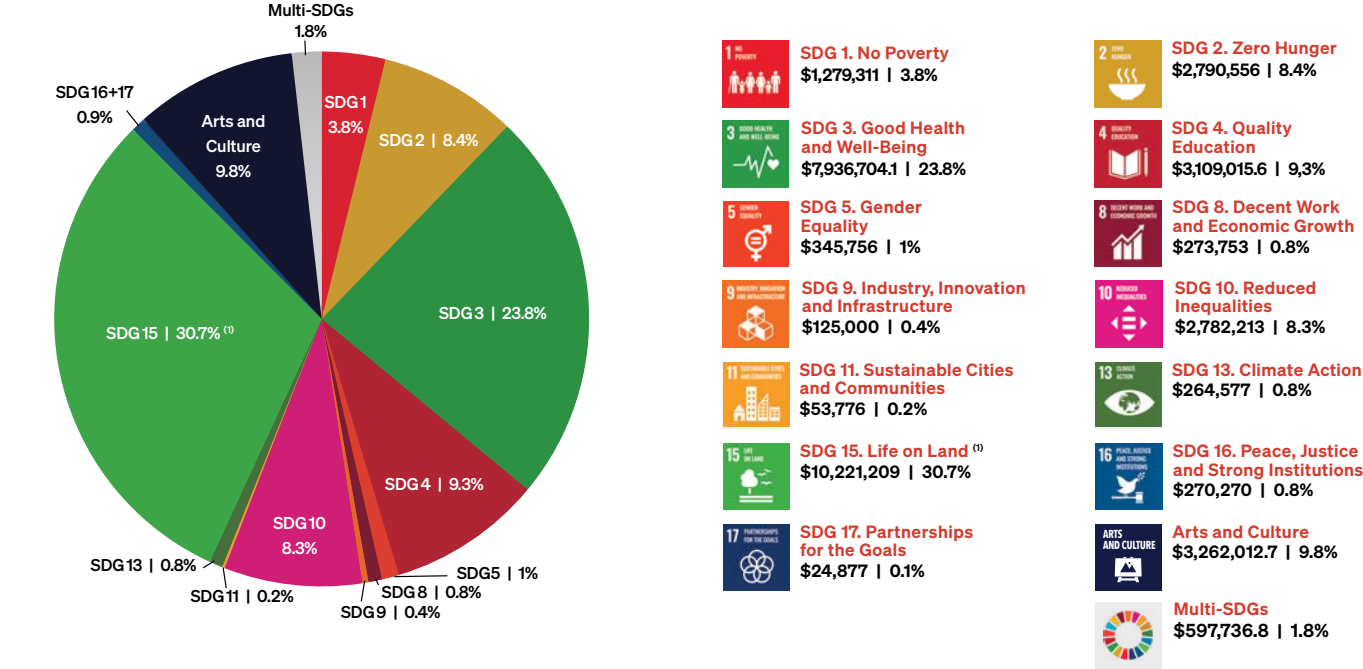
The marked increase in the amount of grants distributed for 2020 is attributable to the disbursement of more than \$10 million by The Age of Union Foundation Fund, and by the allocation of \$10.6 million from the Emergency Community Support Fund (ECSF).

Number of recipient organizations

In 2020, we observe a marked increase in the number of recipient organizations, which is a direct result of the increase in the total number of grants available, and of the better coverage of the territory the Foundation serves, attributable to funds distributed via the ECSF program.

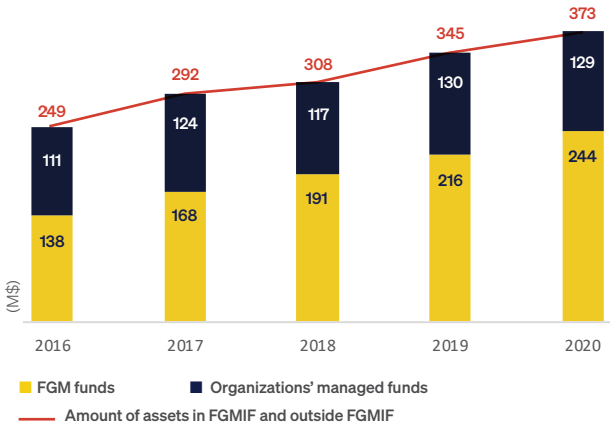

Breakdown of assets under management, in millions of dollars

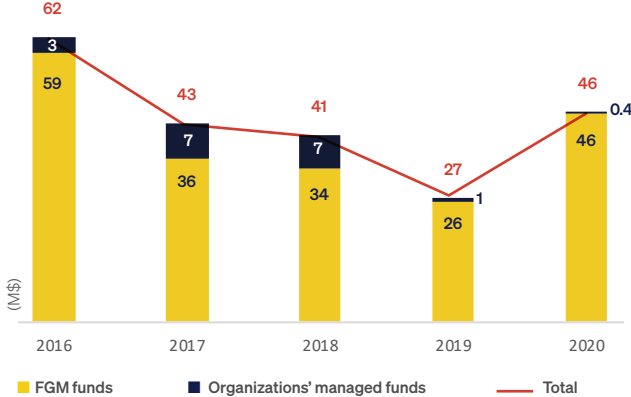
In 2020, FGM went over the \$373 million mark in assets.

Breakdown of contributions, in millions of dollars

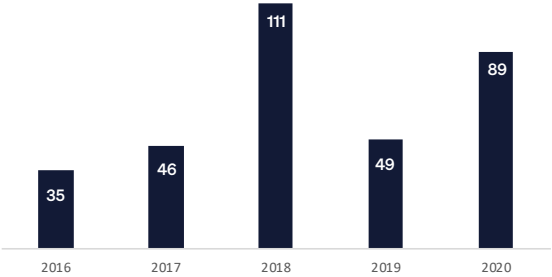
Contributions amounting to nearly \$219 million were received over the last five years.

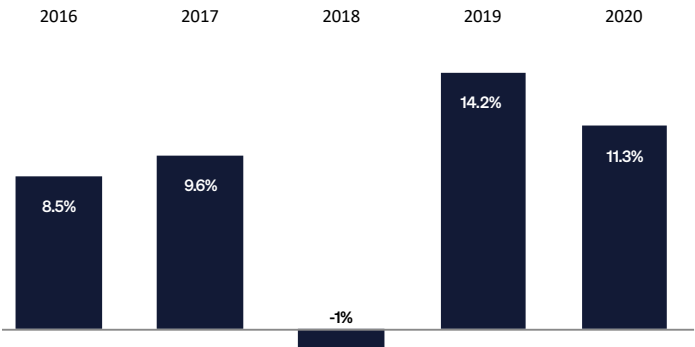

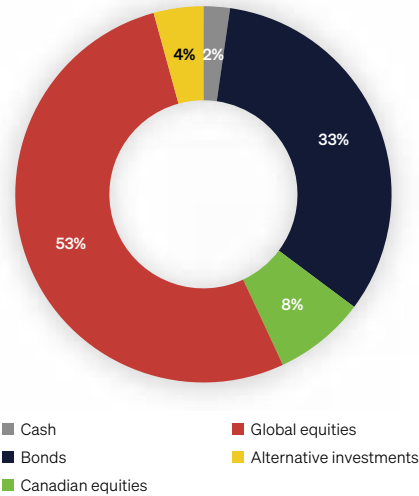
A return on investment of 11.3 % in 2020

After a decline to -1% in 2018, the FGM's gross return on investment rebounded strongly in 2019 and maintained solid momentum at 11.3% in 2020. The annualized gross return on investment over 10 years is 7.8%.

Advantages of the FGMIF

The FGM Investment Fund (FGMIF) was created in 2004. Its objective is to generate additional income through the grouping together of fund assets, and protect fund creators by forging a distinct and unique entity for the management of their assets. FGMIF's orientations are based on the Foundation's investment policy, while its legal framework is governed by the Autorité des marchés financiers (AMF), Quebec's financial markets regulator. The AMF's rules govern the investment fund's obligations as a manager, while taking into account its specificity, for example its duty to be accountable to fundholders (with regards to financial statements, the portfolio's performance, etc.). It is subject as well to the rules established by, and monitoring from, FGM's Board of Directors, its Investment Committee and its management.

Direct Access to Fund Statements

Thanks to Access Funds, fund creators can track the progress of their funds online by checking digital statements, a list of administrative transactions and the disbursement of grants to charitable organizations.

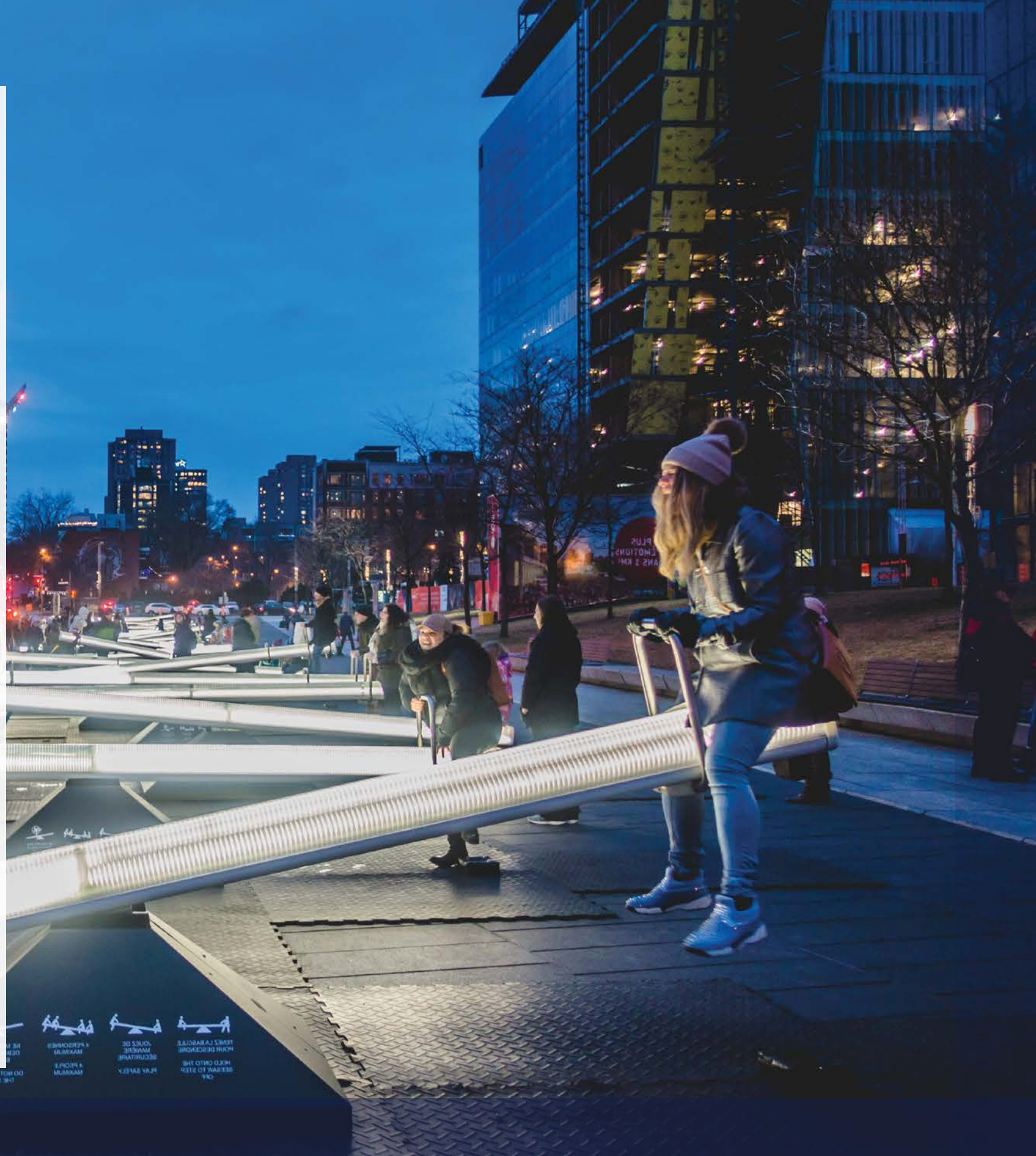
